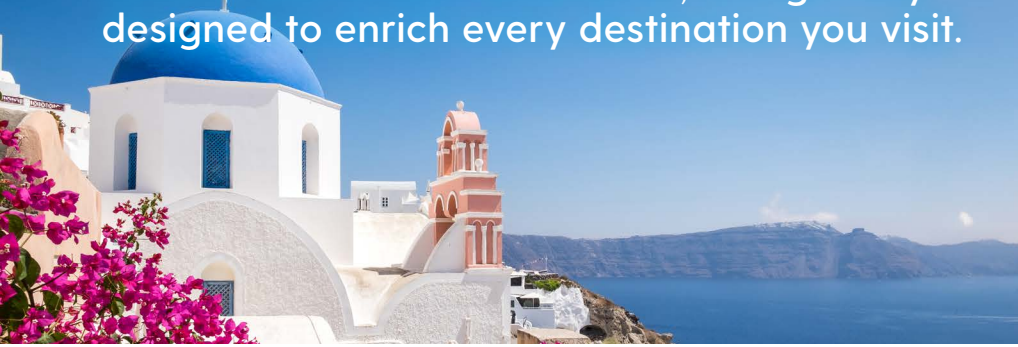

Drive through the business district and historic Colonial area, where splendid architecture and foliage combine to create the perfect backdrop. Stopping at the Merlion Park, where the enduring half-lion and half-fish symbol of Singapore stands majestically. Originally located at the mouth of the Singapore river, it currently stands in the centre of Marina Bay, where you will be able to enjoy panoramic views of the spectacular waterfront. Catch a glimpse of Singapore's cultural aspects during a visit to Little India, a fascinating area teeming with shop houses and flamboyant temples. Visit the Arab Quarter, where you will find a different side of Islam among the mosques and outgoing lifestyle. Stop at a local coffee shop just outside Chinatown which bustles with frantic street merchants. As you drive down Orchard Road, you will see Singapore's ultimate shopping district, a cityscape of one futuristic-looking mall after another. The SkyPark observation deck at Marina Bay Sands will offer the highest and most sweeping panorama of Singapore as it towers 56 stories above the ground. From this lofty vantage point, you will look down on the Gardens on the Bay, its grove of 18 towering artificial SuperTrees and the durian-shaped domes of the Esplanade. Immerse yourself in the otherworldly beauty of Gardens by the Bay, exploring the award-winning Flower Dome and Cloud Forest conservatories, brimming with exotic flora from diverse climates. The Ferris wheel-like Singapore Flyer will offer awe-inspiring views of the urban landscape from yet another angle. You will ride in the comfort of an enclosed glass capsule as the wheel slowly spins on its axis, reaching 42 stories at its highest point. Then, there is the scenic wooden bumboat cruise on the Singapore River. From Clarke Quay, you will motor under bridges, past skyscrapers and along the lush parks that border the riverbanks. Few experiences are so memorable.	Guests must be able to embark/debark the boat as it doesn't have an even walkway and at times might need to walk across boat to boat for boarding. A short drive will bring you to Thian Hock Keng, an extraordinarily ornate temple dedicated to a sea goddess. Built in 1839, it was on the waterfront until a land-reclamation project extended the shoreline. The temple is revered for its traditional southern Chinese design and for being constructed without a single nail. Re-board your coach for a sightseeing drive through the Colonial District of Singapore, also known as Old Singapore. You will also see the city's first church, St. Andrew's Cathedral, which was named for the patron saint of Scotland, as Scottish merchants funded its construction. A stop will be made on Arab Street to visit and photograph the beautiful, gold-domed Sultan Mosque. The Sultan Mosque further exemplifies the city's religious diversity and early history, as it was built in 1824 by Singapore's first sultan. A cruise down the Singapore River will present a different perspective of the urban landscape, as skyscrapers line the riverbanks. Another icon of Singapore is the legendary Raffles Hotel, where you will make a stop. Years of tender, loving care and pride of purpose have kept this landmark a must-see for any visitor to Singapore. Experience the legendary Singapore Sling, invented in 1915 right here in the Long Bar at Raffles. You may also take this time to visit the Raffles Hotel Shops, for that last-minute souvenir hunting. Singapore	Singapore	SIN-013	Highlights	FOUNDING FOOTSTEPS OF RAFFLES	\$169	3.5	MODERATE	Discover how the vision of Singapore's founding father Sir Stamford Raffles came to fruition by delving into the culture and history of the flourishing island city-state. Your exploration will begin by cruising the Singapore River in a bumboat, a type of vessel that was originally used to ferry supplies from ships moored offshore to the pier. A white marble statue of Raffles overlooks the river at the site where he supposedly first landed in 1819. You will learn more about the founding of Singapore at the riverfront Asian Civilisations Museum, which holds a collection of artifacts that tells the story of Singapore over the past two centuries. Many of the items are even older, such as the treasures found in a 9th-century Chinese shipwreck. You will also visit the renowned Raffles Hotel, a 19th-century landmark named for the Englishman that was highly influential in creating Britain's empire in the Far East, including Singapore.	Guests must be able to embark and disembark the boat with limited assistance and negotiate many steps during visits. That ambivalence will be especially apparent in the city's colonial heart, where you view historical landmarks such as St. Andrew's Cathedral and walk the skyscraper-lined Esplanade. Your orientation of the city begins with a drive through the Colonial Heart of Singapore to the Padang, the island's premier ground for sporting events and get-togethers. From the Padang see the Cricket Club, Parliament House, Supreme Court and City Hall. Walk along the enchanting Esplanade, lined with futuristic skyscrapers, chic restaurants and boutiques. Even the statue of the official mascot, the Merlion, reflects Singapore's duality. The lion half of the mythical Merlion figure is a nod to Singapore originally being called the "lion city"; the fish half honours Singapore's humble beginnings as a fishing village. A tour of the lavish Sri Mariamman Temple in Chinatown will present a glimpse into Hinduism, one of five main religions practiced here. The colourful statues adorning the roof are particularly noteworthy. Despite Singapore's outstanding architecture, UNESCO chose to recognise the city instead for its botanical gardens. As you will discover, the lush site demonstrates its evolution from a British colonial tropical garden to a scientific institution for conservation and education. Depending on the traffic conditions, you will visit either the vibrant ethnic enclave of Chinatown or the bustling Maxwell Hawker Centre to indulge in the local street food, which includes every cuisine imaginable. The riverboat cruise from Clarke Quay will present a unique waterfront perspective of Singapore, as you will pass an array of modern and colonial landmarks. The ride to the island on a cable car will be extraordinarily picturesque, as it will offer a literal bird's-eye view of the harbour below and Brani Island, which lies between Sentosa and the mainland. Upon arriving at the museum, you will enjoy a cultural immersion that tells Singapore's story through dioramas with live actors and authentic furnishings. Madame Tussauds takes a different approach by presenting wax figures of local idols and international celebrities. After the museums, head down to Sentosa's latest attraction, Sentosa Sensoryscape offering a unique blend of nature, architecture, and cutting-edge technology featuring large-scale outdoor interactive light art, a nature-inspired soundscape, and augmented reality (AR) engaging five senses and inducing "sixth sense" of imagination each crafted to captivate your senses and create unforgettable memories and you will have some time to explore on your own. As night falls, you will watch the Wings of Time, an outdoor show with spectacular multi-media effects, lasers, robotic water fountains and pyrotechnics. The wonderfully entertaining performance tells an epic tale.	This tour involves about two hours of easy walking and standing with many steps to negotiate. You will get a candid glimpse into daily life by watching the locals shop in the Tiong Bahru Market, a traditional wet market, as opposed to a market that only sells dry goods such as textiles. You can expect to see a staggering variety of garden-fresh produce, just-caught seafood and exotic flowers. In the northern reaches of Singapore, you will pause at the Kranji War Memorial, where thousands of soldiers from World War II are buried. Bright Hill Temple encourages reflection of a different sort, as it is Singapore's largest Buddhist temple. Stop a Tampines New Town for a walking tour of the area. Tampines New Town residential district has received the United Nations' world habitat award for being an outstanding human settlements area. Follow your guide on a walk around the town, which gives an insight into the typical Singaporean lifestyle, showcasing the neighbourhood and the community where schools, shopping malls, restaurants, libraries and a sports hub can be found. As an introduction to the avian world, you will watch an array of colourful, highly intelligent birds show off their prodigious talents in the Sky Amphitheatre. You will then be free to walk about the park on your own and observe other species that interest you. You might see Gentoo penguins – the world's fastest swimming penguin – zipping through the water and hear snow-white Bali mynas singing a song composed of chuckles, squawks and scratchy chatters. There are fearsome-looking raptors such as the Philippine eagle, wide-beaked tawny frogmouths, dinosaur-like Southern cassowaries and neon-coloured rainbow lorikeets, whose brush-tipped tongues help them feed on nectar and soft fruits. Bird Paradise lives up to its name by sheltering more threatened avian species than any other zoological park in the world. Drive along Orchard Road, the city's glossy hotel, shopping and entertainment district before arriving at The Raffles Hotel. Evoking a sense of grandeur and colonial-era charm, Raffles Hotel Singapore is a landmark that transcends mere hospitality. It's an experience. And at the heart of this experience lies a cherished tradition – Afternoon Tea at the Grand Lobby. As you walk through Chinatown's maze of narrow streets, you can't help but become enthralled by the vibrant atmosphere and striking architecture. One of the highlights will be visiting the Buddha Tooth Relic Temple, a relatively new Tang Dynasty-style complex that it holds an ancient sacred relic – a tooth from Buddha that was recovered from his funeral pyre in India. You will delve deeper into the Chinese culture at Tea Chapter, a tea house where one of its masters will demonstrate the art of brewing tea. You will learn about the origins of Chinese tea, the characteristics of it and the details of the tea ritual. Using this new-found knowledge, you will then brew your own tea and enjoy the sensory experience of drinking it.	This tour includes approximately 1.5 miles of walking at a steady pace, part of which will be on cobblestone and uneven surfaces. The tour is not recommended for guests on wheelchairs, scooters or with any limited mobility. Singapore	Singapore	SIN-038	Highlights	BUZZING AROUND IN SINGAPORE (VVV)	\$469	4	EASY	Ride around Singapore in a vintage car with stops for cocktails and appetizers at some of the city's most iconic and unusual venues. No place is more well-known than Raffles Hotel, a 19th-century landmark named for the Englishman that was highly influential in creating Britain's empire in the Far East, which included Singapore. There, at the Long Bar, where the iconic Singapore Sling was invented, you will enjoy a favourite beverage. The next venue will be a hidden speakeasy known only to locals as it is cleverly disguised as a traditional Chinese medicine shop. The bartender will mix a drink infused with exotic herbs and serve tropically inspired tapas that pair perfectly with it. After buzzing around Singapore a bit more, you will pause for yet another cocktail at the SkyBar at the Marina Bay Sands, an extraordinary 5-star hotel that offers the ultimate panoramic view of the skyline.	Due to the nature of this tour, it is only available for guests 21 and over. Guests should drink responsibly. Semarang Java	Indonesia	SEM-002	Highlights	FASCINATING BOROBUDUR	\$239	9	MODERATE	Journey through the dramatic landscape of central Java to the UNESCO World Heritage site of Borobudur, the world's largest Buddhist monument. Constructed in the 8th and 9th centuries of grey volcanic stone, it was then mysteriously abandoned and covered with volcanic ash after neighbouring Mount Merapi erupted a few centuries later. The temple that stands today was painstakingly excavated starting in 1814. It is a stepped pyramid with three main levels, each representing a stage on the way to enlightenment. While meandering along the pathways of Borobudur, you will see hundreds of carved reliefs, statues of Buddha and bell-shaped monuments known as stupas. It is a spectacular temple unlike any other. After exploring the site, you will be treated to a buffet lunch of Indonesian specialties and a traditional performance. You will then proceed to a workshop where batik and silver jewellery are hand-crafted.	Travel time to and from Borobudur is about three hours, including a comfort stop along the way. The tour involves a considerable amount of walking with at least 100 steps. It is not considered suitable for wheelchair guests or those with mobility concerns. Participants must be at least 12 years old. For calls that fall on Monday's, guests will be only able to reach the foot of the temple with a walk around.
Semarang Java	Indonesia	SEM-003	Highlights	HIGHLIGHTS OF SEMARANG	\$139	5	MODERATE	This tour provides a wonderful opportunity to see some of Semarang's most popular attractions. Travel to Central Java to discover some of its highlights and stop at the Grand Mosque, located in Gajah Raya Street, for a photo opportunity. Semarang's Old City is a silent witness to the history of Indonesia during the Dutch Colonial period; some of its 50 ancient buildings still stand. Among the sites that you'll visit is Sam Poo Kong, a unique temple where all religions and ethnicities are welcome to worship. The temple foundations were built by Admiral Chen Ho, a Muslim explorer of the Ming Dynasty. After the destruction of the original temple, by a massive landslide in 1704, the local community rebuilt it in the present location. Your panoramic drive through the city takes you past Simpang Square. Continuing the colonial theme, you'll stop for refreshments located in a classic colonial building at Old City Area. Explore Blenduk Church from the Outside Building due to the renovation progress. Drive back to harbour and rejoin with the ship.	This tour is not available to guests who utilise a wheelchair. Semarang Java	Indonesia	SEM-004	Local Discovery	VINTAGE TRAIN & PLANTATION	\$239	7	MODERATE	Ride a vintage train through the lush tropical landscape of central Java and then enjoy an enlightening tour of a coffee plantation. As a prelude to the train ride, you will browse the Ambarawa Railway Museum, which contains a remarkable collection of steam locomotives. You will also see historical train signs, bells and period furniture from the late 19th century when the railway station was constructed. The roundtrip train ride between Ambarawa and Tuntang villages will be extraordinarily scenic, as you will pass tiered rice paddies and small streams set against a backdrop of green hills and majestic mountains. Afterwards, you will visit a coffee plantation and learn how the beans are grown and processed. The Dutch introduced coffee here in 1600s, and it became so prevalent that "Java" became a generic term for coffee that is still used today.	This tour includes a moderate amount of walking and several of the sites are not wheelchair accessible. Therefore, the tour is not considered suitable for wheelchair guests. The train is not air-conditioned.
Semarang Java	Indonesia	SEM-005	Highlights	SEMARANG & ANCIENT HILLTOP TEMPLES	\$179	6.5	STRENUOUS	Ride horseback into the mountains of central Java and on to the magnificent Gedong Songo Temple complex. Constructed during the 8th century, the temples were discovered in 1804 by Sir Stamford Raffles, the Lieutenant-Governor of British Java, and they are considered excellent examples of the Early Classic style of Javanese architecture. You will reach these Hindu temples on horseback by riding along a pine-forest trail to a height of 4,000 feet above sea level. From this elevated vantage point, you will enjoy breathtaking views of the island's interior. If it is a clear day, you will see a line of volcanoes on the horizon. Although the temples aren't large and are scattered about the hilltops, the views will make the journey all the more memorable. You will have time to discuss the trek over lunch at a highlands resort.	This tour involves 3½ hours of travel by bus, van and horseback. It is not recommended to wheelchair guests, pregnant women, or guests with mobility concerns, heart problems, high blood pressure, asthma, epilepsy, back or neck injuries or physical limitations. Participants may need to sign a release form. There are no restrooms on the coach, but restrooms are available at the temple complex and at the resort.
Benoa (Bali)	Indonesia	BAJ-001	Highlights	DISCOVER BALI	\$249	5.5	MODERATE	Delve into the fascinating culture of Bali, starting with a Barong dance performance that tells the story of the fight between good and evil. You will enjoy a different aspect of Balinese culture at Tohpati Village, where you watch artisans demonstrate Batik cloth processing by using various methods to apply the colours and prints to the fabric. Conventional Balinese life is revealed in a house compound that the residents consider a living organism because of the way the rooms are organised with a figurative head, arms and legs. The 17th-century Singapadu Temple is noteworthy for its four statues of Wisnu that rest on carved pedestals. Bali is also known for its diversity of wildlife, particularly avian species. Bird Park contains the world's largest collection of Indonesian birds, and as you wander about you will see birds in their natural habitats and in walk-in aviaries.	This tour includes limited walking and steps, but is not suitable for wheelchair guests as the sites are not wheelchair accessible. Guests with mobility concerns should evaluate their ability and stamina before joining the tour.

Under the influence of western painters who settled in Bali in the 1930s, Balinese artists began painting single scenes instead of narrative tales, using images from everyday life as their theme. Your visit to Peliatan includes time at one of the local galleries where you can view the beautiful works created by gifted Balinese artists. Original designs in delicate filigree make Balinese jewellery one of the most remarkable styles in Asia. But war always has its cost, and these provocations of the enemy made Darwin a constant target for retaliatory bombings. You can see actual film footage of the bombings along with many other wartime artifacts during your visit to East Point Military Museum, out on a scenic spit of land at the harbour entrance. Heading further inland, you'll tour the sprawling aircraft collection at the Australian Aviation Heritage Centre. The showstopper here is a massive B-52 bomber on permanent loan from the U.S., but also on display are a B-25 Mitchell, Mirage and Sabre jet fighters, a US Army Huey Cobra with rocket pods and Gatling gun, a Mark VIII Spitfire replica and the fascinating wreckage of a Japanese Mitsubishi Zero. The exhibits at Pearl Luggers, a museum in the heart of Broome’s Chinatown, include early diving suits with weighted boots, historical footage of pearl divers and two of the nearly 400 “pearl lugger” vessels once operating in the area at the peak of the industry. In contrast, the exhibits you’ll encounter at Malcolm Douglas Crocodile Park have paws, claws, and plentiful teeth. Operated by the family of the renowned wildlife documentary filmmaker, the venue’s residents include several varieties of crocodile and alligator along with other iconic Australian creatures like kangaroos, dingoes and emus. It’s also a great place to pick up that crocodile-tooth necklace you’ve been wanting. Then, on a stop at Gantheaume Point along Cable Beach, you can admire the fossilized footprints of those crocs’ toothy prehistoric predecessors – cast for eternity in the reef rock. Although coastal-dwelling Aborigines have harvested and traded pearls for centuries, it wasn’t until Europeans arrived and diving suits were invented that pearling became a large-scale business in the area. The industry has evolved in the decades since, and Willie Creek Pearl Farm uses the most modern methods to produce pearls by “seeding” oysters. The bivalves sense the introduction of these foreign bodies, secreting the layers of pearlescent nacre that over time create precious pearls. Little is wasted in the process that follows as the pearls are harvested and graded, restaurants receive the oyster meat and mother-of-pearl jewellery is made from the shells. To better understand how it all works, you’ll board the vessel Mutiara Putri for an up-close view of pearl farming underway in Willie Creek estuary. Admire harvested pearls in the farm’s showroom and, after returning to Broome, consider making a visit to the Willie Creek Pearls store on your own. Still, pearling is the thread that runs through so much of Broome’s history as you will discover at the Cygnet Bay Showroom, a jewellery store that specialises in cultivated pearls. The beaches are just as alluring, and you will see one of the finest – Cable Beach, whose name derives from the telegraph cable that runs from there to Java. The building housing the Western Australian Museum is quite modern, but its intriguingly presented collections of the region's natural and cultural history span from its earliest Aboriginal days to the present. A must-see at this museum is the Shipwreck Gallery, which recounts the stories of the HMAS Sydney and the Dutch Batavia, shipwrecked on the offshore reefs during her maiden voyage in 1628.
