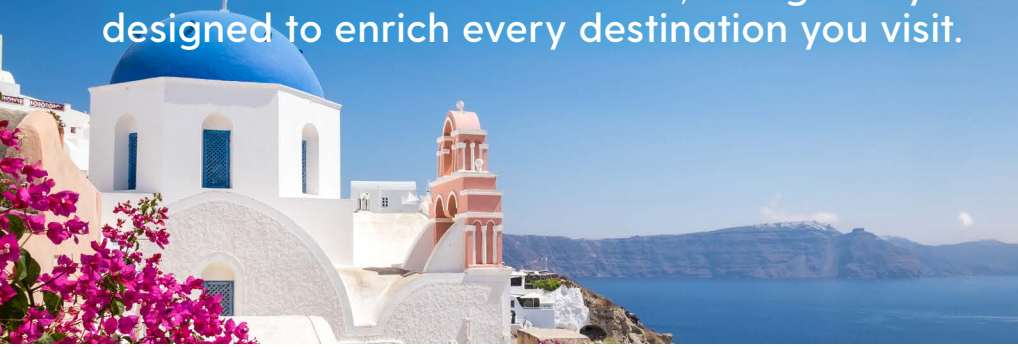

Here, enjoy a leisurely stroll along the shore, taking in the serene ocean views and the vibrant beach atmosphere. Visit Kings Park in Perth, which is one of the world's largest and most beautiful inner city parks, on the way to Swan Valley. Continue your journey to the heart of Swan Valley. Spend a delightful day savouring spectacular wines, beers and cuisine in Swan Valley, the aptly named "Valley of Taste." This fertile area is home to dozens of wineries, including Sandalford. Founded in 1840 on the riverbanks of Swan River, it is one of the area's largest privately owned wineries. You will sample several varieties within Sandalford's different brands. You will then visit the prestigious Nikola Estate. Nestled among sweeping grapevines, this estate offers a premium wine tasting session that showcases the best of their meticulously crafted wines. Learn about their winemaking philosophy and savour the rich flavour that have made their wines renowned. Enjoy lunch at Nikola Estate. Be sure to leave room for dessert, as you will also stop at the Margaret River Chocolate Factory. Tastings are available as well as sweets such as handmade truffles, creamy fudge and gourmet chocolate bars.	This tour includes approximately 90 minutes of easy to moderate walking/standing plus any additional walking at the guests' discretion during free time. The tour is available to wheelchair guests who have a collapsible wheelchair, are able to make their own way on and off the coach and have an able-bodied companion to assist them. A ferry will bring you to Rotto as it is affectionately known. As you will discover on an introductory walk, the island is laidback, serene and wonderfully scenic. You will learn even more on the driving tour that follows, especially with regard to the island's history. Chances are, you will spot quokkas lazing about as the world's largest population of these teeny marsupials live on Rotto. If you stop for a selfie with one, it is sure to be a great photo as quokkas look like they are perpetually smiling – the reason they are called "the happiest animals in the world." Later, while exploring independently, you might relax on the beach, take a refreshing swim and enjoy the panoramic views from atop the 19th-century Wadjemup Lighthouse. For an introductory look at Fremantle's twin city of Perth, you will pause at Kings Park to take in the scenery. One of the world's largest urban parks, it overlooks one of the widest sections of the Swan River. Continuing on, you will soon arrive at the Perth Mint, which opened in 1899. You might watch pure gold heated to molten temperatures and poured into solid bars, hear tales of the mint's history and see the world's largest gold coin. It tips the scale at one ton, making the coin the world's biggest, heaviest and most valuable gold bullion. You will next cruise the lovely Swan River, which will present a different perspective of Perth's skyline.	This tour includes approximately 1 hour of moderate walking / standing. Fremantle	Australia	FRE-015	Highlights	FREMANTLE & PERTH ORIENTATION	\$99	4	EASY	Discover the charms of Fremantle and its vivacious twin city Perth through their historical architecture and idyllic parks on the meandering Swan River. The meticulous restoration of Fremantle's Victorian and Edwardian architecture has helped to revitalize the downtown, where you will drive from one landmark to another. It's the only UNESCO World Heritage site in Western Australia. You will also see the even older Round House, which has 12 sides and only looks round, and Burswood Park, where you will pause for photos before continuing on to Fremantle's twin city of Perth. With the Darling Ranges as a natural backdrop and much of the city overlooking the river, it is beautiful setting. Perth's prosperity is evident throughout, but especially along Millionaire's Row, which you will pass on the way to King's Park, a serene oasis where you will enjoy free time.	This tour is primarily panoramic in nature with limited optional walking at the stops. The tour is available to wheelchair guests who have a collapsible wheelchair, are able to make their own way on and off the coach, and have an able-bodied companion to assist them. Fremantle	Australia	FRE-016	Highlights	FREMANTLE - THE CONVICT FOOTSTEPS	\$99	2	MODERATE	Walk through Fremantle's vibrant downtown, admiring historical attractions such as the city's first jail and a revitalized area full of restaurants and shopping malls. Much of this district was constructed by British convicts that arrived in the 19th century. Ironically, they built their own prisons, including Fremantle's oldest building, the Round House, which operated as a prison until 1886. You will also see Fremantle Prison, the only UNESCO World Heritage site in Western Australia., a designation it earned as a physical reminder of Europe's colonial expansion through the presence and labour of convicts. Of course, there's more to Fremantle's past than prisons. The city is also full of Victorian and Edwardian architecture from its boom years, when gold and wheat drove the economy. Being on the water, Fremantle has a rich maritime history, much of it detailed in the Western Australian Maritime Museum. The best water views are from the Esplanade that hugs the coast.	This walking tour includes 2 hours of moderate walking that covers approximately 3 miles. There will be some steps, inclines and uneven surfaces to negotiate. The tour is not available to wheelchair guests or those with walking difficulties. Albany	Australia	ALH-002	Highlights	COASTAL HIGHLIGHTS & WHALING STATION	\$179	4	EASY	Discover the natural beauty of the Albany coast and get a glimpse into the past by visiting Australia's last whaling station. Along the way, you will pause for photos at the Gap and the Natural Bridge, two extraordinary rock formations sculpted by the forces of nature. Upon reaching Discovery Bay, you will visit Albany's Historic Whaling Station, which closed in 1978, making it the last of its kind. After watching an enlightening film about the history of whaling, you will board the Cheynes IV, the world's only preserved whale chaser ship, an experience that will offer a look into the lives of the whalers and how they processed the behemoths on the open decks. To help you understand how huge these creatures can grow, a skeleton of a blue whale is on display. You can also view a rare collection of scrimshaw, the artwork that whalers carved into whale bones during their leisure time.	This tour includes about 2½ hours of walking and standing on mostly flat surfaces and a few steps. This tour is available to wheelchair guests who have a collapsible wheelchair and are able to make their own way on and off transportation. Albany	Australia	ALH-003	Highlights	CITY SIGHTS & ANZAC CENTRE	\$139	3	EASY	Tour landmarks in and around Albany, concentrating in part on the vital role that the troops from Down Under played during World War I. You will first stop at a wind farm that generates electricity from a collection of eco-friendly wind turbines atop the coastal escarpments. The towering turbines supply about three-quarters of Albany's electricity by using adjustable blades that capture the wind from any direction. Continuing on, you will see Dog Rock, a naturally formed boulder that looks like a giant dog's head, and the Mount Clarence Memorial, a tribute to the soldiers of the Australia New Zealand Air Corps or ANZAC. Constructed on King George Sound, where 41,000 men and women departed to serve in World War I, the ANZAC Centre presents even more details about their sacrifices. While browsing the centre, which is located within the Princess Royal Fortress, you may see gun batteries, barracks and underground magazines used to store the propellant cordite.	This tour includes about one hour of walking and standing on mostly flat surfaces with a few steps. This tour is available to wheelchair guests who have a collapsible wheelchair and are able to make their own way on and off transportation. After boarding the vessel at Emu Point Landing, you will settle in for a relaxing journey around the harbour and up into the Kalgan River. Wildlife is abundant in these natural areas, and you may spot Australian pelicans, pied oystercatchers and black-winged stilts. Farther upstream, where the water is less brackish, you are more likely to see wedge-tailed eagles, red-capped parrots and laughing kookaburras. Don't forget to look for marine life, as giant eagle rays up to 17 feet long sometimes swim just below the surface and have even been known to leap out of the water. Albany	Australia	ALH-005	Local Discovery	THE BEST OF THE GREAT SOUTHERN WINERIES	\$199	4	EASY	Enjoy tours and tastings at two esteemed wineries around Albany, a subsection of the vast Great Southern wine region that makes the most of its Mediterranean-like climate. The carbon-neutral vineyard at Oranje Tractor Wines wasn't planted until 1998 but it didn't take long for the organic wines produced from its grapes to become acclaimed. During the immersive tasting experience in the cellar, you will sample a flight of five wines – Riesling being the dominant one – thoughtfully paired with locally sourced delicacies. At Paul Nelson Wines, a family owned and operated vineyard & winery, you will taste through some of the most awarded wines in the Great Southern. Sourcing fruit from their own vineyards, the oldest planted in 1968, you will see an amazing cross spectrum of wines and styles. All wines are made using a variety of winemaking medium such as clay amphora and large foudre casks. Paul's winemaking philosophy is drawn upon from his many years working overseas and all wines are made to reflect each vineyards personality. During this visit, Paul will impart his many years of experience and guide you through a seasonal range of wines paired with local cheeses and music. Albany	Australia	ALH-006	Highlights	ALBANY ON FOOT	\$119	3	MODERATE	Delve into the history of Albany on a leisurely walk-through downtown that includes stops at the most enlightening heritage attractions. While browsing the Museum of the Great Southern, you will get a glimpse into the lives of the indigenous Menang Noongar, the Aboriginal people that inhabited the area before Albany was founded as the first European settlement in Western Australia. Similarly, the Convict Gaol Museum will candidly shed light on the mid-1800s when convicts from Great Britain were first brought to Albany. Many of them were skilled labourers that helped build the city's roads and other infrastructure projects. After a cup of tea in a quaint café, you will explore the Patrick Taylor Cottage Museum, which occupies the oldest dwelling in Western Australia. It dates to 1832 and contains hundreds of fascinating artifacts. You will also admire the historic architecture of the St. John the Evangelist Anglican Church, the state's oldest consecrated church. Subject to opening hours, you may have the opportunity to browse its interior.	This is a walking tour covering about 1.5 miles. While there is no significant difficulty with steep hills, those with mobility concerns are cautioned to evaluate their personal level of ability and stamina. Esperance	Australia	EPR-001	Highlights	ESPERANCE IN A DAY	\$279	7	MODERATE	Get to know this remote Western Australia looker on a panoramic coach tour that includes brilliant white beaches, sunbathing kangaroos, archipelago lookouts and some very unusual leather goods. If there's one thing that absolutely defines Esperance, it's ravishing beaches. Expect blindingly white sand, see-through aquamarine water, rounded granite boulders and, yes, lolling kangaroos. You'll stop in at several of them during this day, including Cape Le Grand, Twilight Cove, West Beach, Hellfire Beach and Lucky Bay. In each instance, you're likely to think you've now seen the most incredible Esperance view of all, only to change your mind at the next locale. You'll stop for photos at Stonehenge, a full-scale replica of that other one in England, cut from pink granite and often surrounded by grazing cattle. Visit a wind turbine farm powered by sea breezes. Enjoy a picnic-style lunch along the shore and, if time allows, go for a delicious dip in Lucky Bay. Visit Pink Lake, so-named for the algae that dye its waters bright bubblegum pink at times. And browse an in-town wonder or two, including Mermaid Leather, where one-of-a-kind handbags, wallets and accessories are crafted from tanned barramundi, grouper and shark skin.	Walking on this tour is primarily at guests' discretion during the stops. There will be uneven and sandy surfaces to negotiate and some parts of the coach ride may be bumpy. Esperance	Australia	EPR-003	Highlights	CRUISING THE ARCHIPELAGO	\$229	3	MODERATE	Cruise the unspoiled islands of Recherche Archipelago by roomy catamaran and spot wildlife like sea eagles, sea lions and dolphins. Known locally as the Bay of Isles, this collection of 105 islets earned the name "Recherche" from a French expedition who passed by in search of a vanished navigator in 1792. Sailing these typically-calm waters aboard the 60-foot MV Southern Niche, you might feel like you vanished here yourself for about three hours. Most these picturesque islands feature large granite outcrops and heathland vegetation, their shores dotted with brilliant white beaches. The contrast makes it easy to spot marine mammals like Australian sea lions and New Zealand fur seals as they bask lazily in the sun. You might also spot bottlenose dolphins enjoying the bow waves of the catamaran. Coastal birds are abundant, including the white-breasted sea eagle, often seen majestically swooping down to pluck a fish from the water. The greyish birds gathering onshore are likely Cape Barren geese. Your guide will provide fascinating commentary and insights.	This tour includes approximately 30 minutes of easy-to-moderate walking to and from the vessel. The tour is available to wheelchair guests who have a collapsible chair, are able to make their own way on and off the vessel and have an able-bodied companion to assist them; the guide and boat crew are unable to assist. Those with mobility concerns are cautioned to carefully evaluate their personal level of ability before participating. While likely, wildlife sightings are not guaranteed.

Esperance	Australia	EPR-004	Highlights	CAPE LE GRAND NATIONAL PARK	\$139	4	EASY	Relax on one of the spectacularly beautiful, sugar-white beaches of Cape Le Grand National Park, a wild wonderland rimmed by translucent aquamarine water. One of Western Australia's most revered and fiercely protected natural areas, this sprawling reserve features natural beauty in epic proportion. Massive granite boulders litter coastal plains covered with rolling heathland. Miles of broad beaches line the shore, clad in sand so white and reflective it blinds the eye, and so soft it sometimes squeaks as you walk. While the park is barely 75-minutes' scenic coach ride from the city, you'll likely feel like you've landed 1,000 miles from everything. Chances are, the only visitors not part of your tour will be grey kangaroos, known to enjoy lounging on these beaches. It's an unforgettable experience to see them bounding by or even sunbathing in this unexpected setting. You'll have free time for some sunbathing of your own here, or to take a swim or just savour the breathtaking surroundings. On the return drive, you'll stop to blink in wonder at another Esperance landmark – a full-size pink granite replica of Stonehenge built about 5,000 years after that other one in England.	This tour includes just over an hour of easy-to-moderate walking and standing, with sandy surfaces to negotiate at the beach. The tour is available to wheelchair guests who have a collapsible chair, are able to make their own way on and off the coach and have an able-bodied companion to assist them. Esperance	Australia	EPR-007	Highlights	OCEAN DRIVE & TWILIGHT BEACH	\$89	2	EASY	Take in the breathtaking natural beauty of the surrounding countryside by driving along the aptly named Great Ocean Drive. You will pass sugar-white beaches, beautifully rolling heathland and impossibly bright turquoise water, making this circuitous coastal route unforgettable. To enhance the experience, you will pause at several lookouts, the first being Rotary Outlook. From this granite outcrop, you will enjoy a panoramic view of Esperance, an area that a French explorer named in 1792. The islands that you will see in the distance are part of the Recherche Archipelago, a collection of nearly 100 islands. Known locally as the Bay of Isles, the archipelago is largely undeveloped and primarily inhabited by wildlife. More spectacular vistas await you at West Beach and Twilight Beach on the outskirts of town. You will enjoy enough free time in the latter to take a leisurely stroll along the shore and perhaps take a refreshing dip in the sea.	This tour is mostly panoramic with optional walking and a few steps to negotiate during stops. The amount of walking and the level of exertion during free time is at the guests' discretion. Guests participating in water activities do so at their own risk and responsibility and must know how to swim, be comfortable in the water and able to cope with occasional currents.
Esperance	Australia	EPR-008	Highlights	ESPERANCE BY AIR	\$479	1	MODERATE	Fly high over Esperance in a helicopter for a bird's-eye view of the natural beauty that surrounds this visually captivating seaside town. The R44 helicopter features large windows and seating for only three passengers so you will be assured of an excellent view of the landscape below. As you soar over Esperance, you will get a good sense of the topography, especially the curve of Esperance Bay, which inspired the Aboriginal name for this area – Kapa Kurl, meaning "where the waters lie like a boomerang. After crossing the island-dotted bay, you will look down on Cape Le Grand National Park and towering Frenchman Peak, which a French surveyor named for the mountain's resemblance to the unusual hats that French troops wore in the 1800s. Other natural highlights include the brilliant turquoise waters of Hellfire Bay and Lucky Bay, where you may spot kangaroos on what has officially been declared the whitest sand in Australia.	Guests need to walk 600m from the jetty to the helipad and back. Total amount of walking is approximately 1.2km/0.75miles. Maximum weight per person is 136kg/300lbs. Maximum weight allowed on helicopter flight is 220kg/485lbs. Esperance	Australia	EPR-009	Active	ABORIGINAL WALKING TOUR	\$149	1.5	MODERATE	Follow an Aboriginal guide along a trail that winds through Adventureland Park, a serene urban oasis overlooking Esperance Bay. The trail is only about a half-mile long, but there is plenty to discover along the way. The guide – a member of the Nyungar people that have lived in southwestern Australia since time immemorial – will share fascinating Dreamtime stories that explain the origins of the land from an Aboriginal point of view. You will also learn about the six seasons of the Nyungar calendar, which are indicated by changes in the environmental conditions, animals and plants. For instance in the Birak season that spans December and January, the rain eases, the warm weather takes hold and fledglings leave their nests. The guide will offer you a taste of bush tucker, a term for Australia’s indigenous foods, primarily those that the Aboriginals originally consumed. This cultural immersion is an experience that you won’t soon forget.	Guests should expect to walk for slightly less than 1km on easy flat and even path. Those with mobility concerns are cautioned to evaluate their personal level of ability and stamina. Wild animal sightings cannot be guaranteed.
Esperance	Australia	EPR-010	Highlights	WOODY ISLAND ECO TOUR	\$469	5	MODERATE	Ride the ferry to Woody Island for an enlightening exploration of this environmentally protected natural reserve within the Bay of Isles. On the way, you may spot dolphins, seals and sea lions as marine life is abundant, especially close to shore. As you linger over tea at the visitors centre that overlooks Shearwater Bay, the guide will provide an overview of this idyllic island reserve that dense green bushland blankets. During the leisurely walk that follows, you may see indigenous kangaroos and wallabies. Ground-dwelling birds such as rock parrots also thrive here because there are no snakes on Woody Island. Be sure to look skyward for white-bellied sea eagles, the second-largest bird of prey in Australia. You will have plenty to discuss over a lunch of fish and chips at Black Jack’s Bar. Later, you can explore independently, even the wonders underwater as snorkeling equipment is available.	Order of the tour may vary. Blessed by a Mediterranean coastal climate – with spectacular beaches just 15 minutes from vineyards and olive groves – McLaren Vale offers not just great wine, but some of Adelaide’s most satisfying sightseeing. Life jackets must be worn while on the water. Guests must bring their own water bottle, to keep this tour eco-friendly, single use plastic bottles will not be provided. Tour will operate during rain but may be cancelled if the weather is deemed unsafe. The itinerary may operate in a different order. Guests will be provided with transport back to the ship; however they may choose to stay in the city after their tour, but will be responsible for their own transport back to the ship. Wildlife Sightings are not guaranteed.



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
